Learning and Teaching Strategies:

This module take life drawing back to its fundamental theories focusing on how the body is constructed both in its individual parts and as whole. Students will develop the ability to capture the human from in a variety of media, learning to manipulate the medium appropriate to the subject matter as well as studying the theories of image making and visual language. Homework will be assigned each week which will be discussed in the weekly 'discussion time' at the beginning of each class and offer an opportunity for students to ask open questions about their development. A collaborative approach will be encouraged with exercises designed to promote group learning.

Syllabus outline:

Following on from skills developed in Life Drawing 1, students will learn more about different technical principles of life drawing and learn to apply this within their drawings of the model each week.

Fine Art theories will also be included across the course to allow for both technique and theory to develop in unison. There will be a time of discussion at the beginning to allow for group bonding and sharing of the previous weeks homework. This will be followed by practical exercises and more detailed skill sessions in theory. Students will be introduced to the following:

- A range of technical life drawing principles that will focus on individual components of the body and the body as a whole.
- How to manipulate their chosen medium in a manner appropriate to the subject.
- Critical analysis of their work and others to inform their practice.
